Hot Wax! Encaustic

Encaustic medium is created by melting beeswax with damar crystals. The addition of the crystals raises the melting point to 140 degrees. Rendering it durable enough for fine arts applications. It can be used in this form or have colorant (dry pigment) added. The process dates back 1800 years to Greek artists who were creating wax on wood funeral portraits in Egypt. These images survive to this date.

The encaustic technique has wonderful properties. It can be built up in layers, carved and embedded with all sorts of things. Photo transfers and monoprints can be generated and its compatible with oil and wax based materials including, but not limited to oil pastels, caran d'ache crayons, oil paints, shelac, oil pigment sticks and other media. Each layer is fused to the previous one with a heat gun, iron or torch. There are many entry points in learning to use this medium so that beginners as well as professional artists can create works that are beautiful and rich in complexity or elegant in their simplicity.
